

Donation Outfits Electrical Program




Magelsson shows off electrical donation.

It was Saturday morning and I was sleeping in...Dan Harshman called from Chinook asking me if I was a part of the new Electrical Technology program at Northern. I sleepily stammered that, "yes, I am." Dan says, "I have a little bit of stuff to donate, then, to the program in memory of my father, Maurice Harshman [Harshman Electric]; would [I] be willing to drive down with my pickup truck and pick some stuff up?"

When I got over to Chinook, I found Dan inside an old wooden garage that was jam packed with electrical materials, parts, supplies, boxes, bins, and shelves stocked and bustin' the seams of the building; we had to navigate through very narrow paths inside the garage to get to everything. He, just so matter of factly, said, "Take whatever you want." I looked at him in amazement at what he had just said; shook my head to rattle my brain a bit…"did you just say, 'take whatever you want?" "Yes". Wow, really?

Harshman's have donated well over 37,500 dollars worth of electrical parts, materials, etc.; light fixtures, boxes of all types, screws, motors and motor control parts, thermostats, conduit of all sizes, panels, breakers, fuses, switches and receptacles of all kinds, various tools, wire and cables; whatever you can think of seeing in a parts warehouse. It took seven truckloads to get it all to the college; I had to call the Dean, Greg Kegel, and a willing friend for help to move it all. I cannot express how much the donation has helped the Electrical Technology program and how much gratitude the personnel and students of the College of Technical Sciences, as well as the rest of the campus appreciate the very generous donation in memory of a loving member of the Chinook community, Harshman family, and the area; we have materials to work with, to build stuff with, to use for building the program around. After serving a tour of duty in the Navy during World War II, Maurice Harshman returned to his home town of Chinook, Montana in 1946. While in the Navy he received basic electrical training; a field he enjoyed and loved. After working for Paulsen's Hardware & Home Furnishing for 29 years, he started his own electrical contracting business - Harshman Electric. Under his steady guidance; Harshman Electric served the Chinook area with electrical contracting service for many decades until his retirement from the business. Maurice Harshman passed away Dec. 12, 2006. His family donated his electrical tools & inventory to the Electrical Technology program at MSU-N.

The Real Toy Story by Eric Clark (HD9993.T693U627 2007) is a detailed look at the toy industry—where it came from and where it is going. Computer Tip of the Week Windows XP tip: Utilize the Windows Logo Key

The Windows logo key is the shortcut anchor for a number of useful commands including the following:

Windows: Displays or Hides the Start menu
Windows + E: Opens the Windows File Explorer
Windows + F: Opens Search for files
Windows + F1: Opens the Help and Support Center
Windows + M: Minimizes all your open windows
Windows + shift + M: Undo minimize all windows
Windows + tab: Moves through taskbar buttons
Windows + L: Locks the workstation

Windows logo keys are located on the bottom row of the keyboard, between the Control and Alt keys. Depending on your keyboard, you may have 2 Windows Logo keys - one on the right and one on the left, or you may only have one.
