They shared some practical insights into practicing, improvisation and musical styles. They are all graduates from Juilliard and will surely deliver an outstanding concert tonight.

The Wholly Brass has been dazzling audiences since1996. Board of Regents Update

The Board of Regents for the Montana University System met in Butte on Sept. 25-26. The September meeting was dedicated to budget reviews and approvals for all campuses under the Regents authority. Over 1.2 billion in spending authority for the entire system and agencies was approved along with the MSU-Northern budget. Chancellor Groseth reviewed the MSUN budget and reported for the first time in six years, Northern's enrollment was up and the slide in enrollment was curtailed. Northern has 1,217 students enrolled with a full time equivalent of 1009.80 reported as the official third week count for the fall 2008 semester. In addition, Northern removed the Bachelor's of Applied Science from moratorium status. The Regents reviewed and discussed the Making Opportunities Affordable (MOA) initiative. This initiative will address needs and plans of 2 year schools and 2 year education in the MUS.

2008 Athletic Hall of Fame Inductions

The 2008 Northern Alumni Association All-Sports Hall of Fame awards will be given during Alumni Games Weekend October 17th and 18th, 2008 on the MSU-Northern campus in Havre, Montana. The awards highlight a 79-year tradition of excellence both in the classroom and on the playing field at Montana State University— Northern. First awarded in 1994, the Hall of Fame has inducted 57 individuals who have contributed to that tradition. MSU-Northern and the Northern Alumni Association will recognize three outstanding individuals joining that esteemed group. Stacy L. Barnes of Great Falls, Montana, Wendy Badgett Bekkedahl of Billings, Montana, and Kevin J. Owens of Hampton, Virginia will each be introduced and presented commemorative awards in ceremonies during the halftime of the Lights/Alumni basketball game.

Stacy L. Barnes, of Great Falls, Montana, competed for the Skylight's basketball team from 1993-97 on four Frontier Conference Championship teams and in four National tournaments. She was a three-year starter garnering All-Conference All-Pacific first team selections her junior year. Barnes was an All-Conference first team selection and player of the week three times her senior year as well as All-American Honorable Mention. She is the 6th all-time leading scorer in Skylight's history with 1,250 points. Barnes is currently employed as a kindergarten teacher for the Great Falls Public Schools at Longfellow Elementary School.

A Broadus, Montana native, **Wendy Badgett Bekkedahl**, was a four-year starter for the Skylight's basketball team from 1994-1997, playing on four Frontier Conference Championship teams that also made four National tournament appearances. As team captain for three years, Badgett earned All-Academic honors all four years. She will be recognized also for her achievements as a member of the MSU-Northern Rodeo team. She placed 4th in the Big Sky Region in Barrel Racing her sophomore year and was 2nd in the Big Sky Region in Breakaway Roping and 4th in the Nation in Breakaway Roping her senior year.

Kevin J. Owens of Hampton, Virginia was a four year player for the Light's Basketball program from 1995-1998. During his freshman year, he led the team in rebounds, setting a new school record for a season with 306. That year, the Light's won their first Frontier Conference Championship and became the first Montana team to ever reach the quarterfinals in the NAIA national tourney. Owens was selected as the Pacific Northwest Region player of the week his sophomore year and played on two more Frontier Conference Championship teams. One of the team captains his senior year, he finished his career at Northern in 5th place on the MSU-Northern all-time scoring list with 1,421 points having garnered all-conference and all-regional honors as well as NAIA All-American Honorable Mention honors.

The alumni games begin Friday night with the Skylight's/Alumni game at 6:00 pm and the Lights/Alumni game following at 8:00 pm. The Northern Alumni Athletic Hall of Fame recognizes players, managers, and coaches for achievement of athletic honors in their sport and individuals for their outstanding and meritorious service to Northern Athletics. Computer Tips

Excel 2007 Tip: Transpose data from a row to a column, or vice-versa By Marianne Hoppe

Here's a tip that eliminates the need to rekey data. Suppose you've entered your data with three column headings running across the top of the sheet (Row 1), and three row headings running down Column A.

After working with the data for a while, you decide you'd rather have the current set of row labels running across the top of the columns. Whatever you do, don't even think about rekeying the data!

You'll find the best solution under the **Paste** menu. Start by selecting and copying your entire data range. Click on a new location in your sheet, or on a new sheet. Then, on the **Home** tab, click the triangle under **Paste** (found on the left side of the menu) and then select **Transpose**. Excel will transpose the column and row labels and data. (Note: if Transpose doesn't appear on the menu - select **Paste Special** from the Paste menu, click the **Transpose** check box and then click **OK**)
