Dean Finalists Announced

The search for a new Dean of the College of Education, Arts and Science and Nursing has been narrowed down to three top candidates:

Dr. Randy Olson was interviewed on November 15th and 16th



Dr. Olson is from Woodbury, MN. He has over 20 years of experience in higher education including Chair, Instructor, and Executive Director of an educational based non-profit organization. He received his AS degree in Electrical Technology from North Dakota State College of Science in Wahpeton, ND. He received his BFA in Studio Arts from the University of Minnesota, his MS in Technical Communications from Metropolitan State University in Saint Paul, MN, and his PhD in Housing and Apparel: Design Track from the University of Minnesota in St. Paul. Major accomplishments in his current position as Chair of Brown College in Mendota Heights, MN include academic assessment, faculty development, and curriculum revision. Film exhibitions include "Oliver Kelly Farm", a 24 minute documentary video in which Dr. Olson received a first place award from the Local Cable Programmers of Minnesota. Current art works include Florida International University Business School in Miami for a kinetic courtyard and sculpture titled "Luna", and River Walk Art Plaza in Jackson, MI for an outdoor kinetic sculpture titled "Velocity." Dr. Scott Searcy will be interviewed on December 2nd and 3rd

Dr. Searcy is from Forest City, IA. Dr. Searcy has over 20 years of experience working in higher education, including Dean, Faculty Chair, Associate Academic Dean, Division Chair, Math Chair, Professor, and Instructor. Dr. Searcy received both his BS and MS Degrees in Mathematics from New Mexico Highlands University and his PhD in Mathematics from Idaho State University. Major accomplishments in his current position as Dean of Assessment and Accreditation include design and development of an online core curriculum. Research interests include Wavelet Analysis: specifically techniques involving the use of wavelets to reduce transmitted noise in audio recordings. Dr. Searcy is also the author of software RANDOM FROG WALK, a program that generates pseudo random directed paths through terrestrial landscapes. The program is useful in determining the validity of GIS modes of animal habitats by comparing actual field data to the pseudo data generated by the software. Scholarly papers include "Morse Code as Data Compression," Iowa MAA sectional meeting, Central College. Dr. Searcy has served as university liaison to regional and national organizations.

Dr. Carol Reifschneider will be interviewed on December 8th

Dr. Reifschneider is from Havre, MT. She has over 18 years of experience working in higher education including Instructor, Teaching Assistant, Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, and Chair. Dr. Reifschneider received her BA in Environmental Studies from the University of Kansas, her MS in Environmental Health Science from the University of Kansas, and her PhD in Environmental Health Science from the University of Kansas. Major accomplishments in her current position as MSUN Chair of EASN include development of new programs as well as improvement of existing ones, faculty evaluations, serving on the Northwest Accreditation team as co-chair, and working with area tribal colleges to complete articulation agreements. Presentations include "Nutrients in WWTP Effluents: Problems and Solutions for the Montana Environmental Training Center, Yellow Bay - Flathead Lake Biological Station. Publications include "Evaluation of Varying Retention Times on Batch Anaerobic Systems," University of Kansas, Lawrence, Kansas. Dr. Reifschneider serves on numerous local and state boards including the MSUN Academic Senate, Lecture Series Committee, and Committee on Continuing Education for Water and Wastewater Operators- Montana Department of Environmental Quality.

Northern Seeks to Help With PTSD Research

Frank Bourke, PhD, Executive Director of the Neuro-Linguistic Programming (NLP) Research and Recognition Project, visited with

faculty and staff from Montana State University Northern the last week of October, 2010 to explore the possibility of developing a University presence for a Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) research project. He met with Drs. Sellars, Foley, Smeby, Petriccione, Bachmeier, Mr. Ashley Smith, Mr. Allan Culp, Mr. John Donaldson, Chancellor Frank Trocki, Provost Rosalyn Templeton, Registrar/Student Dean Lindsey Brown, Dean Janice Brady, and relevant department heads and others exploring research and service needs from the University and NLP Research Project's perspectives. A large number of overlapping interests and needs were found especially in the university's project areas relating to youth at-risk and veterans. The meetings concluded with an action plan for next year that included the joint submission of the research grant on the validation of a new clinical treatment protocol labeled reconsolidation of traumatic memories (RTM); a five day faculty introduction into neurolinguistic programming; and a long-range commitment to seek grant funding to help veterans and youth at-risk with the debilitating symptoms of PTSD. This grant-funded, research project will be a state-wide effort, with an invitation going to all institutions of higher education and the tribal colleges in Montana.

STEAM BOILER WORKSHOP OFFERED IN GREAT FALLS

Montana State University-Northern Extended University is offering a four-day workshop to prepare people to take the state examination for low-pressure boiler operator's license. The workshop is designed for people without boiler operator's licenses who work in physical plants.

The workshop, "Low Pressure Steam Boilers and Systems" will be offered Thursday through Sunday, December 9 - 12, 2010, 7:00 AM - 6:00 PM at the O'Haire Motor Inn, 17 7th Street South, Great Falls, MT. Bill Fisher, Certified 3rd Class Boiler Operator and Certified Water Operator from Missoula, is the instructor.

Computer Corner

Apply auto-fit property to multiple columns simultaneously

You probably know that you can double-click the right border of a column's header cell to automatically adjust the width of a column to autofit its contents. Excel will increase the column width to accommodate the largest entry in the column. What you might not know is that you can adjust the width of multiple columns at the same time. Here's how:

- 1. Select the columns in question Just click and drag across the column headers to select the columns you want to resize
- 2. Hover the mouse over the right-border of *any* of the selected columns until the double-headed arrow appears then...
- 3. Double-click

All the columns selected will auto-size to fit the largest entry in each column.

Now that the Football season is over here are a few more individual records that were broken this year. Landry See had 128 tackles which broke Stetson Kaufman's record of 114, Kyle Kercher had 9 field goals for the season which broke Luke McKinley's record of 8 field goals in a season and Derek Lear ended up with 20 touchdown passes for the season, surpassing Kyle Samson's record of 17 touchdowns.
