EDA Grant Update



Last week we included an announcement about the grant we received from the Economic Development Administration (EDA). This week we held a press conference to share the details of the grant and what it will mean to Northern and North-Central Montana.

In order to receive this grant, MSU-Northern was required to complete a dollar-for-dollar match of the grant funds. MSU-Northern was able to leverage \$400,000 they received from the state as the part of the required match funds for the grant. In addition, the Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development granted a \$247,000 waiver of MSU-Northern's local share. Consequently the state's

investment of \$400,000 actually became a \$1,067,000 investment in the future of North-Central Montana.

This grant will allow MSU-Northern's Bio-Energy Center to function like a proof of concept center for many new companies seeking to test their products. The grant will fund testing, salaries, consumables, and it will also allow MSU-Northern's Bio-Energy Center to purchase a scaled reactor which will help expand their research on bio-jet fuels.

Volunteers Provide Free Tax Help

Free income tax preparation, assistance and e-filing services are available in Havre, Rocky Boy, Fort Belknap and Cut Bank. Trained, IRS-certified volunteers can help prepare and e-file your basic income tax returns starting January 25th. Anyone with a household income of less than \$50,000 is eligible for this free service. This year, you can also opt to prepare your own taxes at Free Assisted Self-Preparation Tax (FAST) sites using the i-CAN! e-file program. Certified preparers will be at FAST sites to answer your questions and guide you through the tax preparation and filing process. This is an opportunity for individuals to learn how to prepare their own taxes while gaining a better understanding of their specific tax situations. You can receive your refund check in the mail in as little as 14 days or have your refund direct deposited into your bank account in 7-8 days. Green-Gerding Passed the 300-Win Mark

Shelia Green Gerding, an alumna of Northern, passed the 300 win mark at Minot State University last weekend. She now has 301 of the 500 total wins in the 35-year history of the program. Shelia has coached at Minot State for 17 years. She is a very intense coach and has helped produce some great athletes and teams.

Sheila Green-Gerding, the all-time leading scorer in the Skylight's program, still holds the all-time record with 1,566 career points. One of the most highly sought after players out of high school, she was an impact player as a freshman and a three-year starter for the most successful women's basketball program in Frontier Conference history. During her four years at Northern, they won four Frontier Conference Championships and made four trips to the National Tournament with a record of 126 wins and 12 losses. During their 1990 trip to the National Tournament, Green-Gerding finished third in the three-point shootout. An Academic All-Conference player for two years, she was known for her work ethic and her leadership. She was an All-Conference player three of her four years and in 1992, she was the District 12 MVP and the Frontier Conference Co-MVP when the team was ranked #1 in NAIA Division II. She was also named an NAIA II Kodak All-American.

Chancellor's Corner

Colleagues:

The Visioning Initiative has generated many thoughtful recommendations. The following suggestions are samples of the many comments offered through the Library display, on-line postings, and emails forwarded to me.

"I would like to see us to be an intensely student-centered institution. The faculty here are excellent and it seems that many faculty are committed to their students and the classes they teach, but I would love to see our focus shift more toward students, who essentially are our customers. Usually issues are geared toward faculty issues versus student issues and the conversations are often negative. I would like to see our attitude toward our students be positive and energetic. I would like to see students come here because they feel valued and know that we want them to be successful."

"How about a 'greener' campus with each improvement to dorms or facilities to make it more and more environmentally friendly? Or all campus vehicles running on our own Biofuels!"

"At MSUN, 2000 students are taking classes in state-of-the-art classrooms where every student is given a laptop upon registration that gives them access to e-texts as well as supplemental materials provided for face-to-face courses. On-line classes and students would be in addition to the 2000 students on campus. If the focus of the institution becomes on-line, why keep the doors open? Shift everything to another campus and save the state \$\$\$."

"I would like to see more on-line degree programs offered. We need unique programs that aren't offered other places and then promote them."

"This is addressed more to Auxiliary Services, but it impacts the education environment. Child care is a necessity for many students, and on-campus child care should return to Northern. Students miss classes, or sometimes even have to drop classes, because of child care difficulties. If we are serious about educating people, we have to facilitate their success by eliminating extraneous worries and allowing them to focus on their studies."

"Maybe a university that builds programs around the environment is a good place for MSUN to be, since we've got a good base through the bio-diesel research being done."

"Donaldson Hall has been restored as a gathering point on campus as well as providing office space/living space for visiting professors from institutions MSUN has developed exchange programs with for faculty and students."

"The campus has a broad/comprehensive intramurals program that is inclusive of more students and is operated by someone with the qualifications/credentials for the position. Activities are ongoing and expanded to improve campus life for all students."

"Partnerships with entities in all program areas are cultivated and maintained; these include advisory boards, co-op placements, and equipment sharing programs."



Each of these suggestions offer an exciting vision for the future and provide an example of the ideas that each of you have for the opportunities available to MSUN in the next five years. I share these with you because I have been asked on several occasions, "Are you really going to take our suggestions seriously?"

There's a simple answer to that question: Yes, I am.

You know the capabilities of the institution and the opportunities in the Hi-Line and in higher education in Montana better than I do. We will be able to collaboratively build a vision only when I have the "benefit of counsel" of you, the individuals who have made a professional commitment to MSUN, the students who have chosen MSUN as their college home, the community who fiercely supports MSUN, the alumni who are proud of their alma mater. Therefore, please avail yourself of the venues available to offer your insight: the Library display, [the website postings](#), or via an email to me or an individual discussion, both of which has been a preferred option for some of you.

The next step in the process will be to collect your thoughts through February 1. I'll then do a thematic analysis and share the results with our existing governance structures and the campus and community at large. Through a dialogue over the next several weeks, by the end of this term we will arrive at a collaboratively-developed vision statement that begins with "Montana State University-Northern will be known for..."

@ Your Library

In my column last week I mentioned 3 databases, Credo Reference, CQ Researcher, and Opposing Viewpoints in Context that you can use to help select a topic for speech or paper. Once you've selected a topic, it's time to move to other databases to locate information to use in writing your paper. The Library currently offers access to more than 70 different databases. Many of these databases are very subject-specific; however, there are several databases that include a lot of good information on a wide range of speech and writing topics. Try Academic Search Complete and Academic OneFile to locate journal and magazine articles. Academic Universe and Newspaper Source Plus are good sources of newspaper articles. These databases also include many full-text articles. You can read/print/download a copy of the entire article directly from the database. This is a big time-saver when doing research. Remember that you can stop by or call the Library staff for assistance in using any of these databases.

Windows 7 Tip

Shake Your Desktop Free of Clutter

If you frequently run multiple programs simultaneously, your desktop can get extremely cluttered. If you're working on one program and want to minimize all the other windows you can accomplish this very quickly with the Windows 7 "shake" feature (in previous versions of Windows you would have had to minimize them individually). With this "shake" feature you can minimize every window except the one in which you're currently working... in a single step. Here's how:

- Click and hold the title bar of the window you want to keep on the desktop; while still holding the title bar, shake it quickly back and forth until all of the other windows minimize to the taskbar. Then let go. To make them return, simply shake the title bar again.

You can also accomplish this by pressing the **Windows** key and the **Home** key at the same time (but doing that is not nearly as much fun!).
