Greg Kegel Named Chancellor

MSU President Waded Cruzado has appointed Greg Kegel, a longtime Montana State University Northern faculty member and dean, as chancellor at MSU-Northern. Kegel assumed his new responsibilities August 30.

"I'm humbled and honored to be asked to lead Northern," Kegel said. "I love Northern and have made it my home. I look forward to working with our faculty, staff and proud community members to make Northern the best it can be for our students."

In making the appointment, MSU President Waded Cruzado said Kegel is a natural choice for the leadership position. Kegel started at Northern in 1982. In 2001, he was named dean and has worked to expand Northern's technical programs, including establishing two-year associate programs in several trade crafts such as plumbing, carpentry, construction, and electrical. He has also worked to strengthen the cooperative student program and has obtained numerous appropriations and grants to benefit the university, including securing funds to build the Applied Technology Center.



Prior to his appointment as dean, Kegel served as a professor of Industrial Technology and Design Drafting at MSU-Northern and was a training specialist for Autodesk. He earned a master's of science degree from Central Washington University.

Lt. Governor Visits Campus



Lt. Gov. Angela McLean was on campus Tuesday morning to tour the campus and talk about the Main Street Montana project and talk about Big Sky Pathways and dual credit opportunities for high school students interested in pursuing college degrees. The Pathways program is funded through a Perkins Reserve Grant given to two-year colleges. It helps guide students in the direction they need to go to plan well during high school in order to finish their college degrees more quickly, so they can enter the workforce promptly. Holly Haas is the Big Sky Pathways Coordinator, and she stated, "Our diesel program is really good at creating pathways with partners around the U.S., solidifying internships and getting students from high school, into college, and into their career choice."

MSU-Northern Appoints Two Interim Deans


Northern's Chancellor Greg Kegel announced on Tuesday that Dr. Carol Reifschneider and Dr. Larry Strizich have agreed to serve as Interim Deans of MSU-Northern's College of Education, Arts and Sciences and Nursing (CEASN) and the College of Technical Sciences (COTS).

"This past week was quite eventful and I don't want the fact that Dr. Larry Strizich and Dr. Carol Reifschneider have been appointed as interim deans to their respected college to get lost in the shuffle," explained Chancellor Greg Kegel. These are two of the finest people I know. They will do an outstanding job as they bring a wealth of experience gained from being the chairs for their colleges. They will be able to hit the ground running."

Dr. Reifschneider has an impressive portfolio which includes a Ph.D. and M.S. in Environmental Health Science and a B.A in Environmental Studies from the University of Kansas. Before coming to Northern in 1995 she taught in the Civil Engineering Department at North Dakota State University and in the Microbiology and Civil Engineering Departments at the University of Kansas. While at Northern she has taught a number of biology, chemistry, and water quality courses in the science department. In addition she has



taught Wastewater Microbiology for Northern's Montana Environmental Training Center in conjunction with the State of Montana's Department of Environmental Quality.



Prior to his appointment, Dr. Strizich was the Chair of the College of Technical Sciences & Professor of Engineering Technology & Computer Information at Montana State University-Northern. Strizich has an Ph.D. in Higher Education - Teaching from Montana State University (Bozeman), Masters of Engineering in Computer Engineering from the University of Idaho; Master of Science degree in Industrial and Management Engineering (software) from Montana State University (Bozeman); and a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering from University of Colorado. Strizich has also been a Professor in Electronics and Computer Engineering Technology at MSU- Northern and a Surface Line Officer in the United States Naval Reserve in NRC Great Falls.

Haas Wins Drag Race



MSU-Northern's own Holly Haas participated in the Hi-Line Drag Strip's Street Eliminator on September the 1st. Though Haas has only been racing since June of this year, she performed extremely well in the sportsman class of the races. The race took place on Malta's 1/8 mile drag strip. Haas competed against about 25 other vehicles and walked away with the (IHRA) Iron Man trophy awarded once per year. Haas had to beat another Havre racer to win the title. Since her car was so fast, running 7.92 and 7.88 seconds in her timed trials, she had to wait at the light for the slower vehicles to start. Then she sped off to overtake them. This was Haas's 5th race, and she will compete in the big money race on the 21st of September in Malta.

Northern art professor, Joel Soiseth recently had his painting entitled "Scary Stories" accepted to the juried National Small Oil Painting Exhibition at the Wichita Center for the Arts in Kansas. Grammar Gal

For many years the apostrophe has caused me grief, and I'm not the only one. I cannot tell you how many creative ways I've seen the little symbol used. Even now, when I edit other people's work, there are times when I have to stop and research whether an apostrophe usage is correct. It's my personal opinion that there are too many dos and don'ts concerning the apostrophe to include them all in this week's grammar snippet, but I'll offer a couple of rules to remember. They might surprise you.

According to the Chicago Manual of Style, when pluralizing proper nouns, do not use an apostrophe.

- The Boyces bought a house in the historic district. (not the Boyce's)
- Many of my Fridays are filled with artistic endeavors. (not Friday's)
- The immigration log reveals that a few Iraqis have immigrated to Iceland this month. (not Iraqi's)

Here's another rule that may surprise you: do not use an apostrophe to pluralize numbers.

- During the Roaring 20s, many women chopped off their hair and wore free-flowing short gowns and beaded jewelry.
- Will five 10s cover the bill for all this dry cleaning?
- The 1990s offered horrific fashion that should never be resurrected.

I hope these tips have helped clear up some of the confusion surrounding the mysterious and somewhat frustrating apostrophe.
