The Armory Gymnasium was full of bustling activity on Monday, October 12, as Northern hosted the first career fair day of the academic year. The Career Center was able to bring forty-one employers to campus. This is the largest number ever to attend the fall event, and the 305 students in attendance made the it the largest Northern career fair to date.

Feedback from all employers was very positive; many stating they were impressed with how many students arrived with resumes in hand. One agriculture employer informed the Career Center that they had just attended another Montana university fair the week before, and didn't have near the number of interested agriculture students stopping by their booth as they did at Northern's fair.

MAT Everybody Loves Zombies, Except Ashley Opens Tonight



This weekend, and two weekends to follow, Montana Actors' Theatre (MAT) will present: *Everybody Loves Zombies, Except Ashley,* an original musical written by Martin Holt with music by Marjorie Holt. The show will run October 16-17, 23-24, and 29-31. The doors and backstage lounge will open at 7:30 p.m., and the

show will begin at 8 p.m. for each performance. There will be a special matinee October 31, at 2 p.m. with the doors and lounge opening at 1:30 p.m.

Here's a snippet of what you can expect from this show: A young makeup artist working on a movie set in Montana falls in love with the lively and liberated assistant director, who in turn is in love with the arrogant and unlikable lead actor. Throw in an eccentric director, a sulky and resentful best boy, a quiet script girl with a secret side, and a cameraman who is obsessed with sandwiches, and you have the recipe for a wild romantic ride - and that's before the zombies show up.

For tickets, adults cost \$15. Seniors, students, and military can attend for \$10 each. MSUN students can attend free of charge by presenting their current I.D.s. Tickets are available at Fiveheads, Bear Paw Meats, Computer Center, Bear Paw Montana Realty, and online. Strong Adult language and themes, may not be suitable for younger audiences.

Tulloch Shares Insights Into Hearing Loss as a Disability



Shawn Tulloch, Program Manager and Deaf Services specialist, talked about awareness of hearing loss as a disability, awareness of hearing loss as an identity, and services and resources for people with a hearing loss (advocacy). She used her personal journey to illustrate how she was born hearing, but as a toddler she lost this ability. As a child, although she needed the help of tutors and special teachers, at home she never received special treatment between her and his brother, who is hearing able. Growing up in a hearing world always encompassed challenges for her such as for example confusion with abstract vocabulary concepts, words that look similar on lips, and more fatigue. Attending college wasn't an easy task either, but after receiving support from tutors, note-takers, sign language interpreters, and technology aids, she obtained a Bachelor's degree in Language Arts from Hope College in Holland, Michigan and a Master's degree in Special Education-Deaf Education from Michigan State University. Tulloch also talked about accommodations teachers and employers can provide to set the hearing impaired whether at college or work for success. The presentation was doubled in American Sign Language by Great Falls Interpreting Services. Clips of it will be available to faculty, students, and staff through the "Tech Snacks" sessions offered by Extended University.

This lecture was designed to acknowledge October as National Disabilities Employment Month, Shawn's Perspectives of Deaf Communities and Deaf Services was a presentation sponsored by Extended University, the Learning Success Center, and the Office of Diversity Awareness and Multicultural Programs (ODAMP) in conjunction with the Disability Employment and Transition Division of the Department of Public Health and Human Services in Bozeman, MT.

As a science student at Northern, Lonebear pursued a full-time internship with Aaniiih Nakoda College to take part in their West Nile Virus research.

Upon the recommendation of her Northern advisor, Lonebear applied for the internship/co-op that earned her six credits this summer while she participated in intriguing research. Her favorite part of the position was the field work, trapping mosquitoes and then testing them for West Nile Virus in the lab. Her hours of commitment to this internship will enable her to graduate

within the next two years, which is currently one of her central life goals.



Lonebear believed her work experience would solely include one lab testing project, but much to her surprise and enjoyment, she was able to work alongside other employees on a variety of research endeavors. Though Lonebear might not have taken in many relaxing and rejuvenating days in the sun this summer, she strode bravely towards her goal to graduate on a fixed timeline. In the process, she learned

invaluable information and gained experience that will help her jump straight from her education at Northern into the bustling science field and workforce.
