#### **MLK White Balloons Peace Walk**



# Native American Activism on Climate Change Issues

Yesterday, University of Montana Professor, Dr. George Price, presented his talk: "Native American Activism on Climate Change Issues and the Global Connections and Implications of this Issue." He offered valuable insight into some of the indigenous viewpoints of climate change issues and suggestions on how we can all help make changes to mitigate these issues, including insight into the creation and maintenance of his own permaculture farm on the Flathead Reservation. Dr. Price offered an indigenous perspective that is not often heard. His position on climate change and insights stimulated thought, discussion, and attendee engagement.

Essays and discussions can assess students' real understanding of a topic, but they take a ton of time to grade. Quizzes are easy to grade, but usually only assess low-level learning like memorization and recall. What if you could accurately gauge how well your students "get" something, without spending hours every week grading papers?

One of Northern's instructors has developed some really cool quiz-based assessments, and we'll show you how you can adapt similar ideas to your subject matter. Developing higher-level assessments takes time and effort but can lead to huge time savings later. Bring your questions, and we'll bring the snacks. Tech

# Lecture Features Musically Talented Havre Resident, Ms. Mary Stevens - Jan. 26

The Montana State University-Northern, Chancellor's Lecture Series will host "The Power of Music: The Effect of Therapeutic Music on the Mind and Body" with Mary Stevens on Tuesday, January 26, 2016. This is a lecture and harp demonstration. The performance will be at the Applied Technology Center, Hensler Auditorium, at 7:30 p.m. The presentation is free and open to the public.

Scientific studies have shown the value of music therapy on the body, mind, and spirit of children and adults. Stevens is certified as a Clinical Musician through the Harp for Healing, International Harp Therapy Program (IHTP) and Vibroacoustic Harp Therapy (VAHT). She provides therapeutic music, including Vibroacoustic Harp Therapy, to local hospice patients and the residents of two care facilities in north central Montana. In therapeutic music, Stevens brings entertaining programs and hymn sings to the residents of the Northern Montana Care Center, and provides in-room therapeutic harp music to patients in hospice and in the care center and hospital. Many patients and family members have remarked that Stevens's music provided much-needed emotional and spiritual care and was very instrumental in their healing process.

### Fresno Ice Derby - Jan. 30-31

The 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Fresno Ice Derby at Fresno Reservoir will take place January 30-31. Fishing will be from 7 a.m.- 3 p.m. on Saturday and 7 a.m.- 2 p.m. on Sunday.

Eligible fish include: northern pike, walleye, and perch/croppy (perch and croppy will be combined). Participants will need to have their fish measured within a half hour of the ending time for each day. The weigh-in is located at The Walleye Tavern both days. There will be cash prizes for the three longest northern pike, walleye and perch/croppy caught each day. If one species of the eligible fish in not caught, the money will be divided between the other fish species for that day.

All participants will abide by Montana fish regulations and possession limits. You must have a valid and current Montana Fishing License. Youth 13 and under must be accompanied by an adult-licensed participant. Spear fishing will be allowed. Each participant must be registered prior to the day of the event. The entry fee is \$25 per day or \$50 for both days. You do not have to fish both days. Cash prizes will be awarded specifically for each day and amounts will be determined by the number of participants each day.
