The Northern Lights Athletic Scholarship Foundation hosted its 12th Annual Spring Fling last Friday night complete with cocktails, dinner, entertainment, and many auction items. Northern supporters showed up in droves, ready to participate in one of the greatest fundraisers of the year. The money raised at the event goes toward scholarships for student athletes. Several awards were given including the Bob Bricker Shining Light Award, which was presented, to Jim & Carrie Kato (Pictured above).

Student Athletes of the Year



The 2017 Male and Female Athletes of the Year were announced at the 12th Annual NLASF Spring Fling Dinner and Auction Friday night. Senior Ben Stroh was named the Male Athlete of the Year, while senior Natalee Faupel earned the women's honor.

Stroh, a Chinook native, captured the NAIA National Championship at 184 pounds. He won seven tournament titles throughout the season, and finished with a record of 45-2. He ended the season on a 41-match winning streak, and was named the NAIA Wrestler of the Year.

Faupel, from Butte, was named an NAIA First Team All-American for the second straight season. She holds numerous Skylight basketball records, and is the programs all-time leading scorer with 1829 points. She was a First Team All-Frontier selection for three consecutive years, and was the 2016 Frontier Conference Most Valuable Player.

Gail Rader was born and raised in Havre, MT. She attended Havre schools. After graduating from Havre High School she attended the University of Montana, receiving a B.A. in Liberal Arts in 1959. In 1991 she received her master's degree in Guidance & Counseling from MSU-Northern.

Gail is a licensed real estate broker and has attended many real estate educational courses. She has been involved in several professional associations and manages and is part owner of a large apartment complex in Havre

Gail's community service includes: Havre Community Concert President, treasurer, and board member; Havre Jacyees/Jayceens local and state offices; 1 term in the University of Montana Delegates, Northern Montana Hospital Board member; Boy Scouts of America Order of Merit, Hill County Bicentennial Commission Board member and treasurer; Lincoln McKinley PTA President, Ladies Golf Association Offices, Adult Literacy Tutor; Havre Chamber of Commerce

Committee member, served 2 years as Chair of the Havre City Study Commission, held all local and state offices of

P.E.O. International, MSU-Northern Foundation board member, where she continues to serve in an ex-officio role working with scholarships.

Gail was married to Dr. William A. Rader, now deceased, and has two adult sons: Jeffrey married to Stephanie with daughter Emilie and son Arden living in San Francisco and Jonathan married to Rebecca with daughter Lucca and son Lawson living in Seattle. Gail enjoys activities with P.E.O. work and friends, bridge, mahjong, and visiting her grandchildren.



Dr. Margarett Campbell is an enrolled member of the Assiniboine tribe of Montana and served as the President of Fort Belknap College (now Aaniiih Nakoda College) for 10 years from 1987-1996, after prior appointments as faculty and Dean of Instruction. The tribal college, which was chartered in 1984, became accredited in 1987 during Campbell's leadership. Beginning in 1982 and ending in 1988, Dr. Campbell received three degrees from then Northern Montana College (1988 - Master of Education, Vocational Education; 1982 - Bachelor of Science, Business Education; 1982 - Associate of Science, Business Administration). In 1996 she became Vice President of the Department of Community Services at Fort Peck Community College. She has also served as a Trustee of Fort Peck Community College. Dr. Campbell has served as Superintendent of Schools for the Hays Lodge Pole School District since 2013.

Dr. Campbell comes from a long line of American Indians who served their country. Her father fought in the Second World War and was a prisoner of war in 22 different prison camps

following the Bataan Death March. Her mother was a career educator and principal and retired from Hays Lodgepole in 1988 after 33 years. Both her father, now deceased, and her mother believed in giving back to one's country and community. Dr. Campbell has lived her professional life in service to others. She served three terms in the state legislature (2005, 2007, 2009) and was the House Majority Leader during her final term. She was the second woman and the first American Indian in the history of Montana to hold that position. She carries a strong connection to MSU-Northern as the fourth of five generations of female educators who graduated from MSU-Northern's teacher training program, including her great-grandmother, grandmother, mother, and daughter.

2017 Athletic Hall of Fame Inductees Announced

The MSU-Northern Alumni Foundation is excited to announce the 2017 inductees for the Athletic Hall of Fame; Steven C. Helm Jr ('98), Doug Kallenberger ('05) and Mike Leinwand ('99 & '04). A special induction ceremony will be held on



May 5 on MSU-Northern's campus.

Steve Helm was born in Chicago, Illinois and grew up in Indianapolis, Indiana. He came to Northern by way of North Idaho College where he received an Associate's Degree and played basketball. While at Northern Helm was a standout competitor, leading the Lights Basketball team to the Frontier Conference championship game both in 1997 and 1998. During the 1998 season, Helm was voted First Team All-Conference, was selected as the Frontier Conference MVP, and was selected as an NAIA All-American. Helm and the Lights won the Frontier Conference Championship and competed at the national tournament in 1998. During that year Helm set a new single-season record for free throws attempted, breaking Deon Jones' record.

After graduation, Helm served as a volunteer assistant for the Tennessee Wesleyan men's basketball team. He then went on to coach at Ancilla College for six years, the last five as the school's head men's basketball coach. During his tenure at Ancilla, Helm oversaw a national Coca-Cola All-American, three distinguished All-Americans, as well as five Academic All-

Americans. Helm then went on to serve as the assistant women's basketball coach at Valparaiso University for the next four years. In 2015 he was hired as the head women's basketball coach at Calument College of St. Joseph. Helm lives in Indiana with his wife, Kelly Helm. He has three children, Shandi Kano, Koby Kano and Steve Helm III, who plays basketball at Carroll College in Helena.



Doug Kallenberger came to MSU-Northern's Rodeo team after a successful high school rodeo career. Kallenberger, a Havre native, was a two-time Montana High School Rodeo Association Champion Saddle Bronc Rider and qualified for the National High School Rodeo Finals twice in Saddle Bronc Riding. While competing for Northern's rodeo team, Kallenberger qualified for the College National Finals Rodeo in 2001 and 2003 in Saddle Bronc Riding. In 2001 he was named Northern Rodeo Association Rookie of the Year in Saddle Bronc Riding and was the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association Big Sky Region Saddle Bronc Champion. He was a two-time Montana Pro Rodeo Circuit Finals Qualifier and four-time Northern Rodeo Association Finals Qualifier. In 2013 Kallenberger won the Wrangler Team Roping National Championship.

Kallenberger lives in Havre and works as an Agricultural Loan Officer at Stockman Bank and is the MSU-Northern Rodeo Team Head Coach. He and his wife Emily (whom he met while they were competing for Northern's Rodeo team) have two children, Kenzie and Rome.



Mike Leinwand wrestled his high school years in Forsyth, MT where he was a 3-time state champion. In 1992 his high school team won the state championship, and in 1993 he went undefeated and was named as an honorable mention Asics High School All-American. He wrestled two years at North Dakota State University before transferring to MSU-Northern. While at Northern Leinwand was a two-time NAIA All-American, won the 1998 Heavyweight title and was a part of Northern's 1998 National Championship team.

Leinwand stayed in Havre after graduation and has been very active in Havre Public Schools and as a member of the Montana Officials Association. In his 17 years at HPS, Leinwand has served as a Science Teacher, Assistant Football Coach, Assistant Wrestling Coach, Assistant Track Coach, At-Risk Student Committee Member, Traffic Education Coordinator and Teacher, and he received MSU-Northern's Traffic Education Service Award. Leinwand has been a member of the Montana Officials Association for 18 years, officiating Montana State Wrestling Championships for the last 8 years. He also was co-developer of the Montana Middle School

State Wrestling Championships.

The Athletic Hall of Fame induction ceremony will be held in conjunction with MSU-Northern's Founder's Excellence Award presentation ceremony on May 5 in the Student Union Building Ballroom on MSU-Northern's campus. 

A Northern Technology Snapshot

Greytak Calendar - A Northern Connection



In 1991, I met with Havre pencil artist Don Greytak and asked him if he would be interested in putting copies of his artwork into my idea of an agriculture calendar. At that time, I was a member of the Montana Aggies, a newly formed group that was interested in promoting the future of Montana agriculture. Don said he thought a calendar would be a good project and agreed to provide some of his pieces. The Montana Aggies joined with the Montana 4-H Foundation on this inaugural project. I remember going to our then Northern Foundation Director Tom Reynolds and asking him if we could borrow some money to help with the first printing of the 1992 calendars. That money helped the Montana 4-H Foundation and the Montana Aggies print the first edition. 4-H members throughout Montana and our Northern PAS

Club sold the 1992 Montana agriculture calendars for \$10.00. A portion of the proceeds stayed with the 4-H clubs and our PAS Club and some went to the 4-H Foundation and Aggies.

I used a software program to design the first calendar and collected and placed Montana agricultural events and their dates in each month. I digitized the outline of our state with a digitizing tablet by tracing over a Montana road map. This Montana border has been on the cover of most of the calendars and is still being used. I eventually quit doing the calendar layout and it has since been put together by the Montana 4-H Foundation. This has been an amazing project with an outstanding artist and continues to benefit 4-H youth throughout Montana. Calendars continue to be sold each year by Montana 4-H members and the price has remained the same. What is most astounding is that Havre artist Don Greytak has created and provided 338 different pieces of his artwork for the covers and months of 26 years of these calendars!

Computer Corner

Windows 10 Snap Assist

Window-snapping is a convenient feature for quickly maximizing your screen's real estate. The feature, first introduced in Windows 7, lets you "snap" a window to one side of your screen without having to move it around and resize it manually.

In Windows 10, Microsoft has improved the snap feature to include more options. You can now snap windows so they take up the full half or just a quarter of the screen, and a handy little Snap Assist tool lets you snap windows even more quickly than before.

To snap a window using your mouse, click its title bar and drag it to the edge of your screen. An outline will appear to show you where the window will snap to once you drop it. You can drag & snap windows to the left or right side of your screen. You can also drag them to a corner to snap it to the corresponding quadrant, or drag it to the top of your screen to get a full-size window.

You can also snap windows using keyboard shortcuts. To snap a window with the keyboard, select the window you want to snap and press the **Windows** key and the **Left Arrow**, or the **Windows** key and the **Right Arrow** to snap that window to the left or right side of your screen. If you want to snap it into one of the quadrants, first snap it to the left or right side of the screen and then press the **Windows** key and **Up Arrow** or the **Windows** key and the **Down Arrow** to get it into the top or bottom corner.

If you snap a window with the mouse or the keyboard and you're left with a partially empty screen, the Windows 10's Snap Assist feature will pop up. If you have any other open windows, Snap Assist will bring them up as thumbnails in the empty portion of your screen. All you have to do is click on a thumbnail, and that window will open in the open half (or quarter) of your screen.
