MSU-Northern Hosts Leadership High School Graduation



Yesterday (Mar. 6), MSU-Northern hosted the graduation ceremony for Leadership High School (LHS), a six-month program designed for up to 15 juniors at Havre High School. Offered at no cost to students or the school, the program is a collaboration between the Havre Chamber of Commerce and Havre Public Schools.

Throughout the program, students participated in job shadowing, engaged in school-wide activities, served on school councils, and helped plan school dances and lunch events. LHS, which began in 2000, provides students with hands-on leadership experiences to prepare them for future roles in their community.

The graduation ceremony took place at MSU-Northern's Student Union Building, where Dr. Jennifer Brown, MSU-Northern's Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs & Provost, addressed.

Lecture on American Indian Historical Trauma by Dr. Joseph Gone



On Friday, February 28, at 4 PM, Dr. Joseph Gone, a Harvard professor and Faculty Director of the Harvard University Native American Program, delivered a lecture on American Indian historical trauma at the Little River Institute, presenting in the Sweetgrass Commons. Dr. Gone, an enrolled member of the Aaniiih-Gros Ventre tribal nation of Montana, is a clinical and community psychologist specializing in the mental health of Indigenous communities. His interdisciplinary research examines the intersection of culture, coloniality, and well-being among American Indians and other Indigenous populations.

During his talk, Dr. Gone explored the concept of "historical trauma" and its role in explaining the disproportionately high rates of mental health distress among Indigenous Americans. He discussed how the legacy of colonization affects tribal communities today and considered alternative perspectives on the link between historical oppression and contemporary mental health challenges.

Women's History Month Documentary Series

By showcasing these narratives, the documentary challenges traditional historical accounts and emphasizes the significant contributions of women worldwide.

OTLE Hosts First Brown Bag Lecture of the Semester



MSU-Northern's Office of Teaching and Learning Excellence (OTLE) hosted its first Brown Bag Lecture of the semester, providing faculty with an opportunity to showcase their work and foster a sense of academic community. The event, held in Hagener Science Center 101 ("The Pit"), welcomed both campus and community members, with free lunches available for those who reserved them in advance.

The lecture, titled *Teaching and Learning at the AI Crossroads*, was presented by the Teaching Scholars Group, which included Dr. Gwen Hart, Kristi Peterson, Dr. Praveen Dubey, Dr. Chad Spangler, Kenny Wait, Mary Ward, Erin Markus, and Dr. Mattius Rischard. The group, consisting of nine faculty members from various disciplines—business, health sciences, English, education, and graphic design—shared insights from their collaborative effort in the fall of 2024 to integrate AI into student assignments in ethical and productive ways.

As part of their initiative, the faculty studied *AI: A Practical Guide to a New Era of Human Learning* by Bowen and Watson, using it as a framework to develop assignments and assess outcomes. During the panel, they reflected on their experiences and discussed strategies for future AI integration in coursework.

Lights Wrestlers Heads to NAIA Nationals

Eight MSU-Northern wrestlers have qualified for the 2025 NAIA Men's Wrestling Championships, set for March 6-8 in Park City, Kansas. The tournament, hosted by Visit Wichita at Park City Arena, will feature top competitors from across the nation.

Representing the Lights are Kolten Powers (125), Justin Windauer (157), Travis Waldner (165), Orion Thivierge (165), Devin Crawford (174), Rylin Burns (184), Austin Vanek (197), and Shane Mattson (285). Joining them as training partners and support staff are Kade Willis and Lucas Thacker.

The team will compete over three days, aiming for national titles and All-American honors.



With the 68th Annual National NAIA National Wrestling Tournament coming up this weekend, here is my annual "Northern Wrestling by the Numbers – 2025 Edition".

- 1984 The year that Dr. Dave Greenwood was named the NAIA District 12 Coach of the Year.
- 1983 Northern finished in 17th place at the NAIA National Tournament
- 1982 Northern placed 22nd at the NAIA National Tournament
- 1976 The year that Dr. Dave Greenwood was named the Frontier Conference Wrestling Coach of the Year.
- 168 Number of career wins by Isaac Bartel placing him 1st all-time in Northern history
- 136 Number of wins by Tyson Thivierge as Northern Light wrestler (5th all-time in Northern history)
- 112 Number of career pins by former Northern Light Ethan Hinebauch (most in NAIA history)
- 92.6% Turk Lord's career winning percentage here a Northern (126-10)
- 91.1% Emmett Willson's career winning percentage here at Northern (163-16)
- 91.1% Brian Hilt's career winning percentage here at Northern (51-5) from 1982-84
