MSU-Northern Students Explored London on Study Abroad Trip



Over spring break, eleven MSU-Northern students, accompanied by faculty, high school teachers, and community members, traveled to London for an immersive study abroad experience. The trip aimed to expose students to different cultures, histories, and global perspectives through hands-on learning and exploration.


Dr. Grant Olson, Assistant Professor of Communications and co-trip organizer, emphasized the value of international travel. "Understanding other cultures and ways of life makes students better global citizens," he said.

The group, which included five MSU-Northern faculty members, two high school teachers, and additional community members, visited renowned

landmarks such as the Houses of Parliament, Westminster Abbey, the Tower of London, and Hampton Court. They also explored world-class museums, attended theatre performances, and participated in engaging tours, including a Jack the Ripper walking tour.

Assistant Professor of Biology and co-trip organizer, Dr. Kyra Kaercher, highlighted the lasting benefits of study abroad, noting its impact on academic and professional development. Organizers hope this trip will be the first of many international opportunities for MSU-Northern students.

MSU-Northern PAS Students Compete at Nationals



Over spring break, six students from MSU-Northern traveled to Sheridan, Wyoming, to compete in the 45th National Postsecondary Agricultural Student (PAS) Conference. This marked the first time in five years that MSU-Northern had sent a team to Nationals—and the first time attending with their new advisor.

The conference kicked off on Monday with educational tours. Students had the opportunity to explore either a fish hatchery and learn about fire recovery efforts from last fall, or visit a wool mill and sheep production operation. These hands-on experiences set the tone for the week, immersing students in real-world agricultural applications.

After the industry tours, the students participated in competitions in Ag Mechanics, Veterinary Technician, Equine Specialist, and College Bowl. Dante Otsuka & Keelin Humble placed 3rd in Ag Mechanics, earning John Deere belt buckles and tying for 5th-highest individuals. Other strong finishes included Hunter Holobaugh & Reinhard Bold (7th in Ag Mechanics), Natalie Farlow (13th in Vet Tech), and Natalie & Taylynn Lindsey (6th in Equine Specialist).

The College Bowl team advanced through four rounds.

With this year's success, MSU-Northern looks forward to building on the momentum and continuing its presence at future PAS Nationals.

This past week, a group of students from Idaho State University spent their spring break at MSU-Northern to support the local Chi Alpha chapter and foster a sense of community and faith among students.



London's arts scene also left a lasting impression. Elaine attended a performance by the London Philharmonic Orchestra, listening to Mahler's Fifth Symphony in a world-class concert hall. Dr. Kaercher Gives Lecture at Cambridge



While in London as part of the study abroad program, Dr. Kyra Kaercher was invited to give a lecture at Cambridge University as part of the Ancient Near Eastern Seminar Series—a group run by Cambridge PhD students and supported by the Near East Archaeology and Assyriology department.

Her audience included PhD and Master's students specializing in Assyriology and Archaeology at Cambridge, along with professors, museum professionals, and archaeologists who joined both in person and online. Her talk, titled "Qach Rresh: A Neo- and Post-Assyrian (950–323 BCE) Site on the Erbil Plain," focused on recent findings from the site, including its historical significance and new ceramic research.

Dr. Kaercher will be presenting a lecture on the same topic at MSU-Northern's Brown Bag Lecture Series on Wednesday, April 2, 2025 (11 AM–12 PM, ATC Hensler Auditorium).



Let's jump into the Northern Time Machine and travel back 40 years to the year 1985. By clicking on this link MSU-Northern - Archival Collections we can go back and see what was going on at Northern Montana College by reading an old NoMoCo. (Northern's old college newspaper).

Two very important and exciting things were going on. First on March 20, 1985, KNOG became KNMC and April 2, 1985 Joan Jett and the Blackhearts. Here is a clip from the April 1st, 1985 NoMoCo.

Joan Jett and the Blackhearts Concert tomorrow night

Tickets are still available for the Joan Jett and the Blackhearts concert, Tuesday, April 2. Tickets can be purchased at the Student Life Desk, Listen Inn, Northern Electronics and Rickey's Rekerds.

The concert will start off with "Rail" and rock into the sound of Joan Jett and The Blackhearts. The NMC concert is a part of their first U.S. tour in over a year.

Their latest album, GLORIOUS RESULTS OF A MISSPENT YOUTH.

represents a growth of their talent but retains the sound that the Blackhearts are known for.

The concert is being sponsored by the Student Activities Board with the backing of the ASNMC Central Board.

Ticket prices are \$9 for students, \$11 for general admission and \$13 at the door. The concert starts at 7:30 p.m.

It should be noted that alcoholic beverages are not permitted and will be confiscated at the door.

KNOG becomes KNMC

Carl Puckett, station manager of KNOG-FM 90.1, the Northern Montana College student radio station, announced that, effective March 20, 1985, the station will use the call letters, KNMC-FM.

The station obtained the new call letters only after a number of people expended a large amount of time and effort, according to Puckett. Students staffing the radio station began the process of getting the KNMC call letters transferred to the Havre radio station in 1976. At that point it was discovered that these call letters had been assigned to the out-of-service merchant marine vessel, the Agnes S. Quillin.

It was believed that it would be impossible to get the identifying call sign transferred to the NMC radio station; however, Puckett tackled the project once again in January, 1985.

After a series of letters back and forth to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), Puckett learned that the call sign could be transferred to KNOG if the commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard agreed to give up the Agnes S. Quillin's call designation. Puckett quickly contacted the commandant of the Coast Guard and received his permission for the switch.

On February 27, Puckett sent a formal request to the FCC's Call-Sign Bureau for the KNMC designation. Puckett received notice of the assignment of the call letters KNMC to the college station Wednesday, March 20, and the station began identifying itself with its new call letters that day.
